

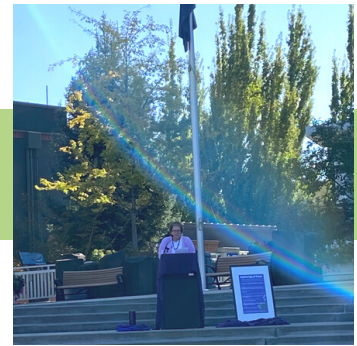
ANNUAL REPORT

Take a look at some of our 2022 accomplishments:

- Actively worked with the Oregon Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence (OCADSV) to provide the Governor and the State Legislature with informed input and guidance on policy and funding related to domestic violence.
- Continued the use of a telehealth platform to provide more options for survivors to receive services.
- Implemented the Safe Stays by ReloShare program to provide more temporary safe housing for survivors fleeing imminent danger.
- Provided increased financial support for survivors, especially for those in need of housing stability and legal support.
- Expanded counseling services with a new self-care group for established counseling clients.
- Deepened our partnership with Pacific University by providing free eye and dental clinics to survivors during Domestic Violence Awareness Month.
- Distributed 1,000+ purple ribbons throughout October to honor survivors during Domestic Violence Awareness Month.
- Supported families with holiday gifts and goodies from the Holiday Shop and Holiday Giving Program.

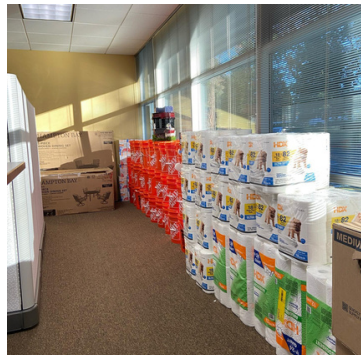
